Description Solanum dulcamara, also known as bittersweet, bittersweet nightshade, bitter nightshade, blue bindweed, Amara Dulcis, climbing nightshade, fellenwort, felonwood, poisonberry, poisonflower, scarlet berry.

Planting & Care

Sticky Nightshade is a densely prickly perennial herb, native to South America. It has naturalized in parts of India. Leaves are pinnately cut into lobes. Leaves are up to 30 cm long, segments up to 10 cm long, on 10 cm long stalks. Leaves have thorns on the ris.

Sunlight: Full sun

Soil: well-drained soil

Water: Medium

Temprature: 20 °C

Fertilizer: Apply any organic fertilizer

Care:

- Even the sepals are armed with yellow prickles.
- The sepals grow to 1.
- 5 cm long during fruiting period.
- Star-like flowers are purplish or white, 1.
- 6-3.
- 5 cm across, with ovate petals, 1 cm long, 4-8 mm wide.

Special Feature:

Woodland gardens, naturalized areas. Provides quick cover for fences, arbors, trellises, posts, walls or other structures in the landscape. Also may be grown along the ground to camouflage rock piles or old tree stumps.

Use

Ornamental use:

- The plant is used for ornamental purpose.
- Its generally kep indoor in living room and in terrac area.

No serious insect or disease problems. Euonymus scale and two-marked treehoppers may cause significant damage in some areas.
