Planting & Care

plant care may require a bit of effort, but the results are well worth the work. Not all plants are fragrant, but the most common and hardy do produce a sweet, carrying fragrance. Common is a vine and has larger glossy green leaves than Royal. Both can survive in temperate climates if they are planted in a sheltered area.

Sunlight: Full sun

Soil: well-drained soil

Water: Medium

Temperature: 50-60 °C

Fertilizer: Apply any organic fertilizer

Care:

- Plants love water—but don't drown them.
- That is, they don't like to sit in water, and they'll die if the soil is too wet in winter.
- The ideal soil is rich and loose, with good drainage.
- One of the worst mistakes you can make is to not provide adequate drainage.
