### Description for Diervilla Rivularis, Kodiak ( Golden )

Easily grown in average, medium, well-drained soils in full sun to part shade. Tolerates some drought. Wide range of soil tolerance.

### Planting and care

Honeysuckle vines are easy to grow, vigorous, heat-tolerant, and nearly indestructible. The flashy and fragrant flowers will attract hummingbirds and butterflies all Summer long. The resulting fruit of the flowers will provide a fall treat for your local songbirds as well.

### Caring for Diervilla Rivularis

- Honeysuckle plants prefer full sun, but will tolerate partial sun, and even some light, afternoon shade.
- Once established, the plants need only moderate watering, unless the summer is very dry.

### Typical uses of Diervilla Rivularis

**Special features:** Small hedge. Ground cover shrub. Naturalize in woodland gardens or on slopes. Shrub borders.

**Ornamental use:** The plant is used for ornamental purpose

**Medicinal use:** Honeysuckle stems and flowers are used together as a medicinal infusion in the treatment of upper respiratory tract infections (including pneumonia) and dysentery. An infusion of the flower buds is used in the treatment of a wide range of ailments including syphilitic skin diseases and tumors, bacterial dysentery, colds, and enteritis. Experimentally, the flower extracts have been shown to lower blood cholesterol levels and are antibacterial, antiviral and tuberculostatic.

Honeysuckle is also used to reduce blood pressure. Externally, the flowers are applied as a medicinal wash to skin inflammations, infectious rashes and sores.
