Planting & Care

Easily grown in average, dry to medium, well-drained soil in full sun to part shade. Prefers moist, peaty or sandy, acidic soils, but tolerates a wide range of soils and growing conditions, including drought, poor soils, wet soils, high winds and salt spray (seashore or road salt conditions)

Sunlight:

Full Sun

Soil: well-drained soil

Water: medium

Temperature: 2° 9

Fertilizer: Apply any organic fertilizer

Care:

- A mostly dioecious shrub (male and female flowers appear in separate catkins on separate plants).
- Neither catkin is showy, with only the male flowers displaying color (drab yellowish-green).
- Flowers on female plants, if pollinated, are followed by attractive clusters of tiny, grayish-white fruits in late summer which usually persist through the winter, but are not particularly showy.

Special Feature:

Best in groups or massed. A versatile shrub that can be used in woodland gardens or shrub borders, as a screen or informal hedge, in wet or shady sites, or on a bank for erosion control.
