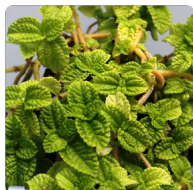


## Pilea Nummulariifolia, Creeping Charlie - Plant

Description Pilea nummulariifolia is a perennial evergreen herbaceous plant commonly known as creeping charlie native to the Caribbean and northern South America. It can be grown indoors, for example in a hanging pot.

**Common name:** Creeping Jenny, Creeping Charlie

**Color:** Yellow

**Bloom time:** June

**Height:** 0.25 to 0.50 feet

**Difficulty level:** easy to grow

**Planting & Care**

Plant where they will receive a minimum of 5 to 6 hours of full sun per day. Plants grown in weak sun may not die at once, but they weaken gradually. Give them plenty of organic matter when planting and don't crowd them. Wear sturdy gloves to protect your hands from prickly thorns.

**Sunlight:** Full sun to part shade

**Soil:** well-drained soil

**Water:** Medium to wet

**Temperature:** 20 and 85 degrees F

**Fertilizer:** Apply any organic fertilizer Apply any organic fertilizer

**Care:**

- plant care is not difficult but does require vigilance.
- The vines need to be trained early when they are young.
- You may use plant ties or just weave them through trellis sections.
- Fertilize the plant in spring just before new growth appears.

- Pinch off the tips of the vines in the second year to promote branching which will fill the trellis with bushy growth.

**Special Feature:**

Excellent ground cover for areas where it can be left alone to spread or naturalize, such as banks, woodland gardens, along paths, or in moist areas near water gardens or along streams, pools or ponds. Also can be planted to cover or spill over stone walls.

Use

**Ornamental use:**

- The plant is used for ornamental purpose.

**Note:**

No serious insect or disease problems. Spreads by runners and can be a very aggressive spreader. Yellow foliage has been known to revert to the green color of the species.
