Description Pterospermum is a genus of tropical trees and shrubs belonging to the family Sterculiaceae. Some species are grown ornamentally while others are valued for their timber.

Common name: Maple-leaved Bayur tree,

Color: green

Bloom time: summer

Height: 50-70 ft.

Difficulty level: easy to grow

Planting & Care

Place 2 or 3 seeds in 7cm (3") pots of seed compost, giving enough water to make the mixture barely moist. Cover the pot with clear plastic wrap. Place the pots in bright light at a temperature of 18 to 21°C (65 to 70°F). Water enough to keep soil from drying out completely.

Sunlight: Full Sun

Soil: well-drained soil

Water: Medium

Temperature: 21°C,

Fertilizer: Apply any organic fertilizer

Care:

- Potting soil used for palm plants should be well draining, and any container used for the plant should have ample drainage holes in the

bottom.

- Soil should be moist at all times during the growing season, although it is essential to avoid over-saturation, which can lead to root rot.

Care:

- Allow the plant soil to dry out a little more in the winter than in the summer.
- A daily mist of water helps to keep humidity levels high.
- If frond tips become brown, the humidity is too low.
- A light fertilizer application from late winter through early fall helps fan palm plants remain vital.
