Planting & Care

Collect your royal palm seeds as soon as they drop from the tree. Seal those you re not ready to plant in an airtight plastic container or a plastic food storage bag. Store them out of direct light at room temperature for up to a month.

Sunlight: Full Sun

Soil: well-drained soil

Water: Medium

Temprature: 35 degrees F.

Fertilizer: Apply any organic fertilizer

Care:

- Put on some work gloves to clean your royal palm tree fruits because the pulpy flesh that encases the seed contains a skin irritant.
- Use a sharp, clean knife to remove the flesh.
- Rub the seed vigorously with your fingers under cold running water to remove any remaining pulp or flesh.

Care:

- Members of the royal palm genus grow in U.
- S.
- Department of Agriculture plant hardiness zones 10 and 11.
- This makes them suitable for a Mediterranean climate and ideal for subtropical environments.
- Royal palms can survive in partly shady conditions but thrive best in full sunlight, soaking up 8 hours or more per day.

- Although royal palm trees are moderately drought tolerant, they grow better in conditions where watering is consistent.
- A layer of organic mulch or wood chips over the area around a royal palm tree can help the soil retain moisture.
