Description Spigelia marilandica, the woodland pinkroot or Indian pink, is a perennial wildflower in the Loganiaceae family that is used as ornamental plant.

Common name: Indian pink

Color: Red and yellow

Bloom time: June

Height: 1.00 to 2.00 feet

Difficulty level: easy to grow

Planting & Care

Indian Pink grows best in partial to full shade in soil with high organic content. It is a very hardy plant. It should be planted no later than the end of July for use in gardens and containers. Once established it should not to be transplanted.

Sunlight: Part shade to full shade

Soil: well-drained soil

Water: Medium

Temperature: -25°F

Fertilizer: Apply any organic fertilizer

Care:

- Water coral bells deeply the night before transplanting them to prevent dehydration and stress.
- Run a hose at the base of the plant until the soil feels very moist in the top few inches.
- Remove just enough soil from the root ball to reveal the ends of the roots.
- Run water over the root ball to wash away a little more soil.
- Avoid handling the roots too much, because they break easily.

Special Feature:

Shaded border fronts, shade gardens, woodland gardens, wildflower gardens or native plant gardens.
