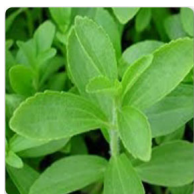


Stevia Rebaudiana - 10 Gm Seeds - buy 1 get 1 free

Description Winter hardy to USDA Zone 10-11 where plants are best grown in rich, consistently moist, well-drained soils in full sun. Tolerates part shade. Consider raised beds as a way to create sharp drainage.

Common name: sweetleaf

Color: White

Bloom time: July to August

Height: 1.00 to 2.00 feet

Difficulty level: easy to grow

Planting & Care

Choose 1-year-old plants grown from seeds or cuttings. Cut them back to about 6 inches, and prune roots as necessary to settle them into 6-inch containers with a light-textured potting mix. Move your stevia plants to a warm, sunny location indoors, or to a heated greenhouse.

Sunlight: Full Sun to Partial Shade

Soil: well-drained soil

Water: Medium

Temperature: 32 F to 35 F

Fertilizer: Apply any organic fertilizer

Care:

- The recommended method is rather to buy garden-ready 'starter' plants, which given stevia's 'growing' popularity, may well be obtainable from a nursery or herbalist in your area — provided you're willing to scout around a bit.
- If you're not, or are unsuccessful in locating any, there are at least three growers of high-quality stevia who will ship you as many baby plants as you'd like.

Harvesting: Harvest in the morning, after dew has evaporated. Plants are easily dried by hanging upside down in a dry, warm, drafty location

Care:

- Plant your stevia so that it has about 18 inches of room to call its own.
- In the loose, loamy, well-drained soil that the plant prefers, it will grow 1 to 3 feet in height, depending on the length of your growing season.
- Wait until after all danger of frost has passed before planting.

Annual for herb garden. Window box or clay pot.
